Special Meeting on Trust Funds June 17, 2018

As many of you know, we at St. Peter's have been blessed with having 3 Trust Funds to help with funding many operations at the church. The individuals who initially designed the Trust Funds 30 years ago did an exemplary job in defining trust terms and developing investment parameters. During the last two annual meetings it was mentioned that the Trustees and Advisors to the funds have been exploring investment opportunities that could potentially provide the church with a significant increase in income.

Both Larry Smith and John Vain have been working directly with First Midwest Bank on potential options for the funds. In reviewing other non-profit organizations and their design on a return to the organization, we have learned that most funds are designed on a Total Return format. Under this design, the organization receives a specific percentage payout of the fund's average 3 year principal balance each year. Most funds also engage in a higher investment ratio of equities versus bonds. Our current fund design allows the Trustees/Advisors to invest a maximum of 25% in equities. Our movement to 25% from 20% in 2017 worked very much in favor of the church. The issue we have faced is that the current design only allows the church to realize income from interest earned on the bonds and dividends on the equities we hold. As those of us who experienced the late 1980's know, interest rates then were high. Over the past 10

years, low interest rates have worked against the fund design; and in turn have provided St. Peter's with a continued drop in income. Although the income received reduced, our equity investments have continued to significantly grow the funds to levels significantly higher than our initial investment.

Recognizing a much different market today versus 30 years ago, the Trustees/Advisors have agreed on a new design for our funds that will be based on the Total Return concept. Under the new design the church will receive annually 5% of the average principal balance of the respective funds. Additionally, the design of the funds will be set to allow the Trustees/Advisors to invest a greater percentage of the principal balance in equities. Collectively, we feel this action will allow the funds to continue to grow and provide St. Peter's to realize a significant increase in income annually to operate the functions of the church.

Pursuant to terms of the Trust Funds, the Vestry has approved the redesign for the St. Peter's Episcopal Church Fund and the St. Peter's Charitable Memorial Fund. The largest fund, the Waterman Farm Trust Fund, requires that 75% of the Voting Members, as defined in the St. Peter's Episcopal Church Bylaws, approve such a change. A special meeting has been called by the Vestry for this vote to be held immediately following the church service on June 17th to review the changes, answer questions and vote on the change to the design for the Waterman Farm Trust Fund. A Mail In Ballot will be sent to all Voting Members, with instructions.

As these changes will significantly impact our church in a very favorable way, we ask that you please mark your calendars and make every effort possible to attend this very important meeting. We do not estimate a long meeting, but the votes by Voting Members to approve the change is needed. We are hoping to have all aspects of the redesign in place by August 1, 2018. **Please note that in the case where a Voting Member does not vote, the action will result in a “ No” Vote (opposing the design change).**

So that all members are clear on the Bylaw provision defining Voting Members, the definition is as follows:

Voting Members: Every adult member of the Parish in good standing is entitled to vote. A member is in good standing if he or she has received Holy Communion in the Church at least three times during the preceding year and has otherwise been faithful in corporate worship, unless for good cause prevented, and has been faithful in working, praying, and giving for the spread of the Kingdom of God; and if his or her name appears on the books of the Treasurer as having contributed by pledge or monetary donation to the operating funds of the Parish during the six months immediately preceding the meeting; and in addition, if he or she declares his or her willingness to conform to the doctrine, discipline, and worship of The Episcopal Church. The Clerk keeps a list of qualified voters in the Parish Register and only those members listed are allowed to vote. Any question concerning a person’s eligibility for voting must be raised before voting begins. The Rector decides eligibility questions and his or her decision is final for the purposes of that meeting and any adjournment thereof. The Rector may consider personal service and circumstances in determining eligibility.

The Waterman Family

Two portraits hang in the Parish Hall. You’ve probably had some occasion to view these and have noted that they represent James S. (1820-1883) and Abbie L. Waterman (1829 -1888). A large portrait of George Douglas Waterman (1848-1856) is found along the stairway leading to the parish library. Douglas was the son of James and his first wife, Mary Ferson Waterman. There were no other Waterman children.

What did James and Abbie do for St. Peter’s Church that warrants this attention and consideration?

It was not until 1856 that an Episcopal Church existed in Sycamore. In October of that year the Diocese of Illinois at their annual convention founded a parish here. Soon after this, the first St. Peter’s Church was built on land that was donated by the Watermans. Later the family gave the land upon which a rectory was built.

Through those early years the parish grew and by 1878, it was desirable that a new church be built. The Watermans gave the entire amount necessary for the construction of our present church building. The cost was \$19,000. That may not seem like a whole lot of money. However, this represented what in present-day dollars would be about \$450,000.

At his death, Mr. Waterman gave a sizable cash donation to the parish and at her death, Mrs. Waterman donated her home and property for the establishment of an Episcopal school that was named Waterman Hall School for Girls. A farm was also bequeathed to St. Peter’s Church which was sold and the funds invested in the Waterman Farm Trust. This endowment is now valued at over one-million dollars. Through many years the distribution from this trust has supported the church in its general funds, in the maintenance and renovation of its buildings and grounds, and in providing funds for outreach. Please study the article in this newsletter concerning this distribution.

When one looks at the rectors who served our church during the lifetime of the Watermans,

we can only be impressed by the excellence of the priests who came to this small town on the Illinois prairie. It is not difficult to assume that Mr. and Mrs. Waterman prevailed upon the Bishop of Illinois to place persons of great ability at St. Peter's.

Last year we initiated a project to make repairs to the gravesites of the Watermans and of the four priests who are buried in Elmwood Cemetery. We were able to clean the gravestones; relocate Mrs. Lily Weichlein's stone to a more suitable location; repair the flower urn at the Waterman grave; and to place engraving on the Waterman gravestone that provides their names and identifies them as the benefactors of St. Peter's Church.

We sincerely appreciate all who contributed to this effort, Larry Dirst, Jane Ovitz, Barb Weaver and John Boies. We would like to conclude the project by repairing a stone step that leads to the graves of the Waterman family, to have the family markers set upon proper foundations, and to level the ground and re-seed the site.

Normally, the Waterman family would be responsible for the maintenance of the gravesite. However, with the death of Abbie in 1888, this branch of the Waterman family ended. St. Peter's Church family is now the family of the Watermans. They deserve continued consideration by the people of St. Peter's.

We are appreciative that this project has been designated as a Red Bowl effort for the month of June. A contribution of any amount is valued. Donations may be mailed to the church office or placed in the Red Bowl; envelopes will be provided. We hope that this year we may conclude this effort and that the graves of the family will reflect the respect which they deserve. We thank God for the gift of these benefactors to our parish family. We thank James and Abbie Waterman for their stewardship of St. Peter's Church which has enabled us to continue to fulfill the ministry that God has entrusted to us through more than 160 years.

Parishioners and friends are invited to visit the gravesites of the Waterman family and of the four priests of the parish in Elmwood Cemetery. In this way, you may understand exactly what we have already done and what we wish to accomplish. **This will take place on Sunday, June 10 from 10:45-11:30. Maps and guides will be available to aide you in locating the gravesites.**

Vestry Minutes April 19, 2018

As approved at the May meeting

The meeting was called to order at 7:00 p.m. by Fr. Jim, who led the Vestry in an opening prayer.

Minutes of the previous meeting were approved without correction. **The agenda for the meeting** was accepted.

During the **Open Forum**, Jane Ovitz offered the information that refreshments would be furnished for the family of Linda Hartlep both before and then following her funeral on Friday, April 20.

The Finance Committee met on Tuesday, April 17. John Vain reported that there are no concerns with the budget at this time. Liane O’Keefe has been requested to review the current monthly rent for the Wetzel and Nolan House properties in order that the Vestry can then determine whether an increase is warranted.

An audit of the parish’s finances for 2017 is to be prepared. The last audit was completed in 2014. There was discussion whether an audit by an individual or company is necessary as opposed to an audit by a committee of the parish. The diocese has indicated that a number of parishes are now conducting their annual audit following a committee format. It is difficult to identify persons who are willing/able to perform an audit and the expense is relatively high. It is possible that we could utilize both methods on some alternating basis. It was decided that at this time we will plan to have an audit completed by an outside person within the next two months.

The last inventory of the holdings of the parish was made in 1996. It is both necessary and desirable that an inventory be made so that

current information is available to present to our insurer in the event of any loss.

Reports of the performance of our trust funds shows that they are lower for the first quarter of 2018. The review of possible changes in the investment of the three trusts is proceeding with the intent to convert them to “total return” trusts.

The parish has been informed that we can anticipate additional monies from the Hines-Reit fund in an amount in the range of \$975-1,300. This will probably occur in August.

Committee reports from Christian Outreach and the Caregivers were provided in written form. There is no new information to report from the Rector Search Committee.

In his report, Fr. Jim expressed appreciation to all those who assisted in the events of Holy Week and Easter. A funeral service will be held at St. Peter’s on April 20 for Linda Hartlep. Fr. Jim will be absent from the office for a few days next week. He will return to his duties on April 26 or 27.

Old Business included Fr. Jim’s recommendation that each Vestryperson be a member of a committee of the parish. Since the Vestry has oversight of all committees, this would allow for closer supervision of the work and progress of each group.

New Business for the Vestry centered on a recommendation for the restructuring of the Building and Grounds Committee. After many years of service, Pat and Tom Klein resigned from the committee at the beginning of 2018. Discussion among Fr. Jim and the wardens concluded that the efforts of the Building and Grounds Committee were often directed to the two rental properties of the parish. In order to change the focus of the committee, it was recommended that we separate the Nolan House and the Wetzel House from the responsibilities of the B&G Committee. In future, the renters would bring to the attention of the parish office any needs they might have for maintenance or repairs. If the request is seen as legitimate, the office would then be charged with providing the names of several

persons or companies who could be contacted directly by the renters. Any major project or repair would still require the approval of the Vestry.

By following this procedure, the B&G Committee would be removed from these types of concerns. It is hoped that they could then become a more forward-thinking committee that can identify the future needs of the parish and create a plan in regard to the maintenance of our properties.

A proposal for the re-organization of the Building and Grounds Committee was presented by Phil Montgomery. This would entail a) the separation of the rental properties from the responsibilities of the committee, b) renters will be instructed to bring any maintenance concerns to the attention of the parish office, which will provide them with direction as to how to find assistance in correcting the problem, c) the Building and Grounds Committee will focus on the renovation and restoration of the parish properties and present plans to accomplish identified improvement projects. This proposal was seconded by Judy Dettloff and was unanimously accepted by the Vestry.

Henry Vincent questioned whether the amount of profit from the rental of these two homes warranted the continued time and efforts of the parish. He suggested that perhaps the parish would be better served by the sale of the properties and the investment of the income from that sale.

Other new business included the recommendation by Fr. Jim that Larry Dirst be named the Parish Historian and Judy Dettloff named the Parish Librarian. Since Larry and Judy have been closely involved with these areas for a number of years, it would seem that to officially recognize them in these roles is reasonable. In the future, Larry will respond to any requests by the public for information about St. Peter's history. Judy will make decisions about the books and materials that will be housed in our library. This recommendation was unanimously approved.

John Boies questioned the upcoming schedule for Sunday School meetings in April and May. Those dates are April 8 and 22 and May 6 and 20, as reported at the February meeting.

A motion to adjourn was made at 8:35 p.m. and this was accepted.

Fr. Jim led an evening prayer before concluding the meeting.


